



When They Had Seen Him

“When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child.” Luke 2:17

“But” he said, “you cannot see my face, for no one may see me and live.” Exodus 33:20

“They will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads.” Revelations 22:4
